- 1. The Chairman, University Grants Commission (UGC) in his letter D.O.No.F.1-1/2015 (CM) dated 8th January, 2015 has communicated the decision of the Ministry of Human Resources Development to implement Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) from the academic session 2015-2016 in all Indian Universities to enhance academic standards and quality in higher education through innovation and improvements in curriculum, teaching-learning process, examination and evaluation systems. The Following guidelines were communicated by the UGC:-
- 2. "Due to lot of diversity in the system of higher education, there are multiple approaches followed by universities towards curriculum, examination, evaluation and grading system. While the Universities must have the flexibility and freedom in designing the examination and evaluation methods that best fits the curriculum, syllabi and teaching—learning methods, there is a need to devise a sensible system for awarding the grades based on the performance of students. Presently the performance of the students is reported using the conventional system of marks secured in the examinations or grades or both. The conversion from marks to letter grades and the letter grades used vary widely across the Universities in the country. This creates difficulty for the academia and the employers to understand and infer the relative performance of the students graduating from different universities and colleges in the country. Hence the UGC has recommended the implementation of CBCS in Universities.
- 3. The grading system is considered to be better than the conventional marks system and hence it has been followed in the top institutions in India and abroad. So it is desirable to introduce uniform grading system. This will facilitate student mobility across institutions within and across countries

and also enable potential employers to assess the performance of students. To bring in the desired uniformity in grading system and method for computing the cumulative grade point average (CGPA) based on the performance of students in the examinations, the UGC has formulated the guidelines and communicated it to all Universities for adoption".

4. UGC, subsequently, in its notification No.F.1-1/2015 (Sec.) dated 10/4/15 has provided a set of 'Model curricula and syllabi for CBCS programmes under the Faculties of Arts, Humanities and Sciences providing the academic flexibility for Universities to make changes/innovation upto 20% in the syllabi of these programmes. It has also specified that all UG programmes should be of three years duration only. UG Programmes with 120-140 credits in the 180 annual teaching days system shall be designated as regular B.A/B.Sc./B.Com., B.B.A etc., Those UG programmes with 140-160 credits or more with fully supported higher number of annual teaching days can be designated as B.A(Hons)/ B.Sc.(Hons)/ B.B.A(Hons)/ B.Com(Hons) etc.

5. Types of Courses:

Courses in a programme may be of three kinds:

- Core Course
- Elective Course
- Ability Enhancement Course (Foundation Courses)

Core Course: A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.

Elective Course: Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope

Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course: Elective courses offered by the main discipline / subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective.

Dissertation / Project: An Elective/Core course designed to acquire special / advanced knowledge, such as supplement study / support study to a project work, and if a candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher / faculty member is called dissertation / project.

Generic Elective (GE) Course: An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic Elective.

Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC).

The Common Board of Studies for CBCS has formulated the Regulations under CBCS following the above UGC guidelines.

- 6. The above courses that do not come under the purview of any of the statutory councils have been recommended to be offered under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) from the academic year 2015-16, onwards.



Strengths

- 1. Sri Ramachandra University is committed to enhance the quality of education, patient care and research. It has earned the reputation as a much sought after Health Sciences University and health care destination among the population at large.
- 2. The University achieved the rank 41A out of 233 Universities across India, by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) released by Govt. of India in 4th April 2016. It has been ranked among the top 5 Health Science Universities in the ranking.
- 3. The Medical Education Unit continues to carry out regular Faculty development programmes for the benefit of faculty from 48 Medical Colleges from Tamil Nadu, Puducherry, Chhattisgarh, Odisha, Sikkim, Tripura. It is a MCI recognised nodal centre for Faculty Development and has trained second largest number of faculty (2600) in the country. The Education units of other Faculties (Pharmacy, Dental, Nursing, AHS) are increasing the scope of training to enhance faculty training initiatives.
- 4. The Central Research Facility has motivated researchers with commitment, leading to more number of research publications in high impact journals. The Centre for Toxicology and Developmental Research facilitates Industry University collaboration.
- 5. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of SRU has functioned effectively by facilitating the development of e-governance portal (SRU Connect) which is increasingly accessed by all faculty, administrators, staff and students. This has enabled the university to function in a transparent manner and cut down on paper correspondence.
- 6. The thrust towards ICT use in the University has resulted in provision of ICT devices in all departments of University and increase the broad band connectivity by tenfold (10 Mbps to 100 Mbps). The IQAC conducted a National Conference on "Setting benchmarks in Teaching & Learning through ICT" during the year. A large number of faculty of SRU and other universities were trained.

- 7. The experts from IQAC of SRU have provided consultancy to other Health Sciences Universities in preparation for NAAC Peer Team visit and also conducted Mock Peer Team visit. The SSR of SRU is quoted as a model for other universities by NAAC.
- 8. Sri Ramachandra Arthroscopy and Sports Sciences Centre (SRASSC) has been actively promoting Sport Sciences by increasing the training capacity and achieved National and International recognition.
- 9. Rapid Review programs are being conducted for Medical & Dental post graduate students and are popular among PG Students from other Universities throughout India.
- 10. SRMC which is the only JCI accredited University hospital and is being viewed as a model health facility for clinical practice guidelines, monitoring of safety aspects and professional skill development.
- 11. Sri Ramachandra Hospital has extended its services making it attractive and accessible to the citizens with low income. It provides cost effective quality health care by a devoted team of Health professionals. It is also the centre for skill training for Medical and Para-Medical students.
- 12. Next Generation DNA Sequencer available in the Central Research Facility sets a new benchmark in Medical Sciences.
- 13. Moving towards more technology integration, Skill labs, ICT enabled modules have been added to promote learner-centric education.
- 14. Inauguration of SRU Boat Club of international standard, expansion of the University Auditorium, sprawling, well-maintained campus, good landscaped gardens, lawns, sports and play fields provide a healthy environment, thus enhancing the ambience.

Weaknesses:

- 1. Technology infusion in education, research and information management needs to be fine tuned to keep pace with international standards.
- 2. The Alumni foundation of SRU has been reorganised but, there is scope for further expansion of activities.
